Pack Up: After last ride.

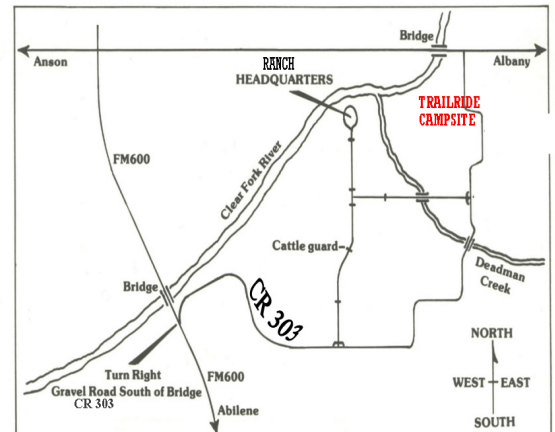
DIRECTIONS: Follow REHAB signs...

From Abilene: From I-20, travel North on FM 600 approximately 16 miles to gravel road before Clear Fork River bridge - CR 303. Turn right & go approximately 7 miles to trailride campsite entrance & then approximately 1 mile to campsite on ranch. Follow REHAB signs.

From Fort Worth/Dallas: Travel West on I-20 to Abilene & follow directions from Abilene.

From Lubbock: Travel South to Snyder and turn East on Highway 180. Travel through Anson, cross FM 600 & travel approximately 7 miles. Turn South immediately after you pass Brazos River bridge (CR 303). Follow REHAB signs.

From San Angelo: Travel North to Abilene and follow Abilene directions.



ALEXANDER RANCH

The Alexander Ranch began in 1901 when Dr. Jim Alexander, a pioneer Abilene physician & surgeon, purchased a piece of land on the Clear Fork of the Brazos River in the Nugent area of Jones County. 109 years later, this site remains ranch headquarters & family owned by grandchildren & great grandchildren of Dr. Jim.

Dr. Jim, a farm boy, was born in a 2 story log home near Spring Hill, Tennessee on September 18, 1867. He first came to Texas in 1884 & arrived in Abilene in December, 1889, as the cattle town's 19th doctor. The ranch began as a 2500 acre cow/calf operation. Through his son, Minor Alexander, the veteran physician's ranching interests expanded to include land spread over Jones, Stonewall & Shackelford Counties. Dr. Jim raised cattle, horses, mules for the Army, feed crops & wheat.

Today management is the responsibility of a grandson, Jim Alexander, & great-grandson, Mike Alexander. The Ranch raises Angus cattle & quarter horses.
